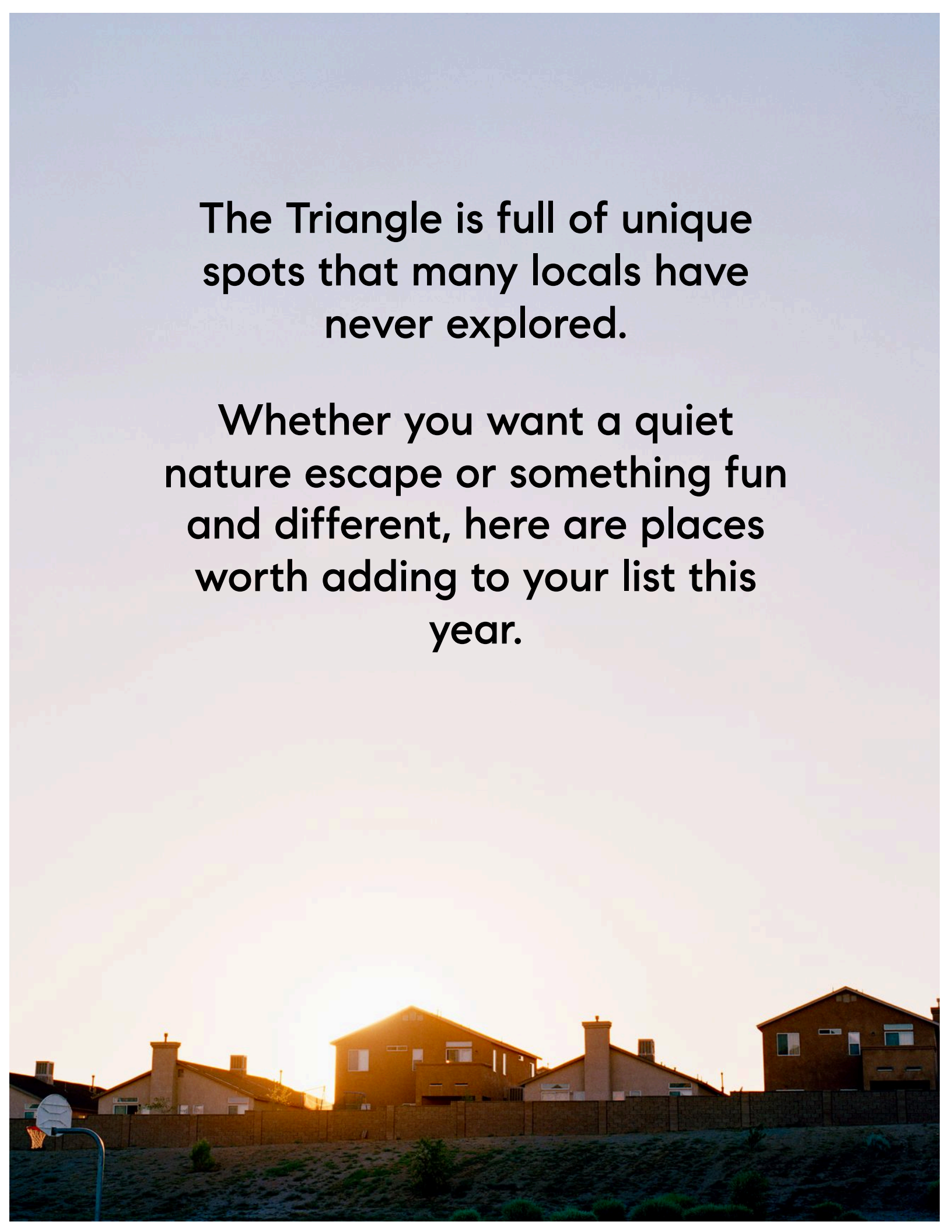


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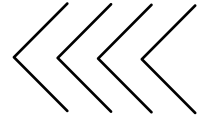

1. Planet Peace Farm

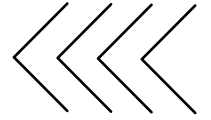

Planet Peace Farm feels like discovering a hidden retreat tucked into Raleigh. The nonprofit farm combines gardens, animals, horses, community spaces, and wellness experiences into something much more meaningful than a typical farm visit. The property immediately feels peaceful, with flowers, open spaces, and quiet corners that encourage visitors to slow down and enjoy being outside.

Visitors can attend events, volunteer, interact with animals, explore the gardens, or simply enjoy the atmosphere. It is one of the most relaxing hidden gems in the Triangle and a reminder that some of the best places are the ones focused on community.



2. Robertson Millpond Preserve

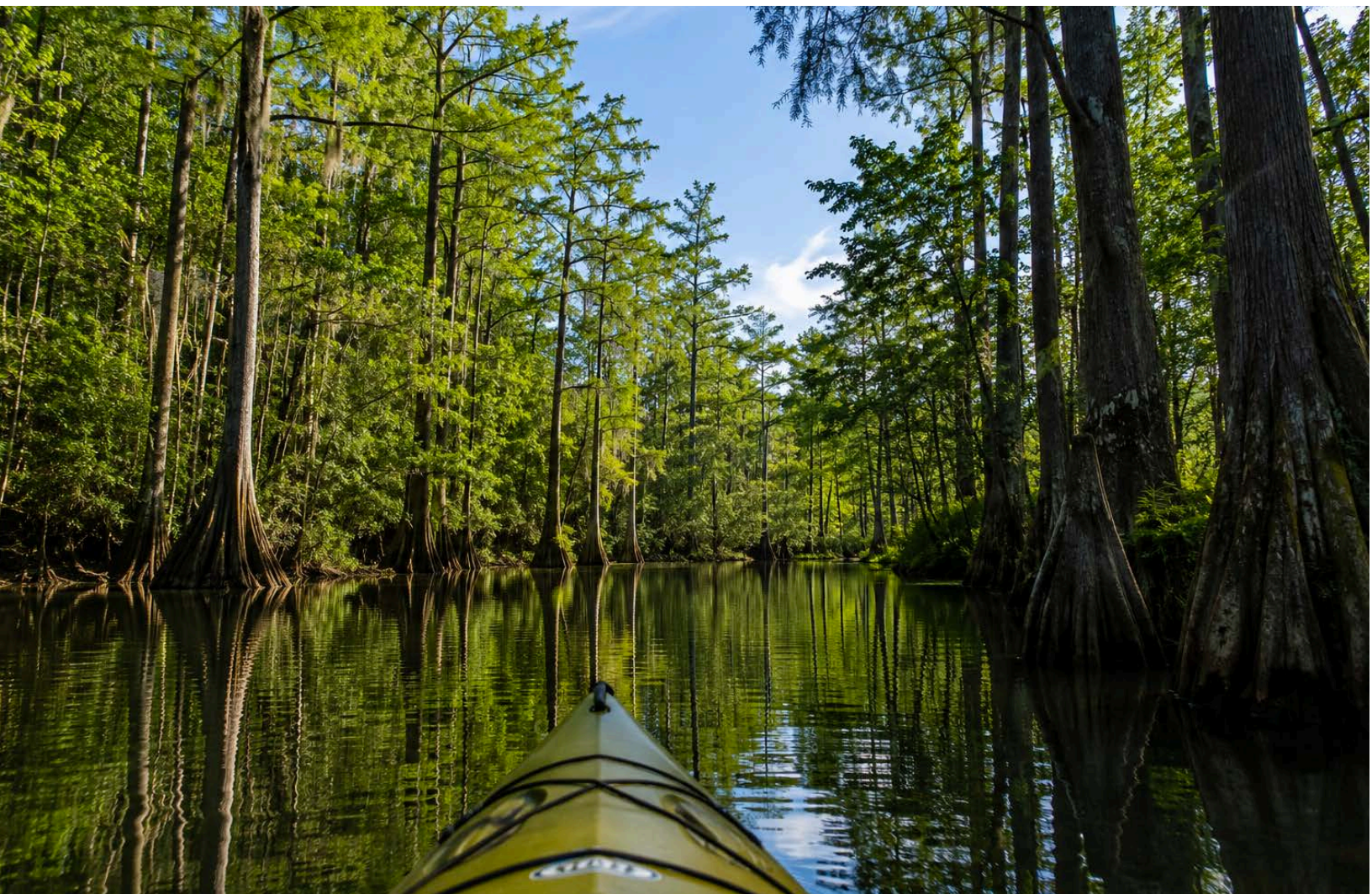

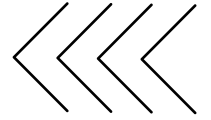

Robertson Millpond Preserve feels more like eastern North Carolina wetlands than Wake County. Visitors paddle through narrow cypress channels and calm water reflections that create one of the most unique outdoor experiences near Raleigh.

Kayakers regularly describe it as one of the area's true hidden gems because almost nobody expects scenery like this nearby. It is peaceful, quiet, and completely different from the greenways and parks most people know.



3. WRAL Azalea Gardens

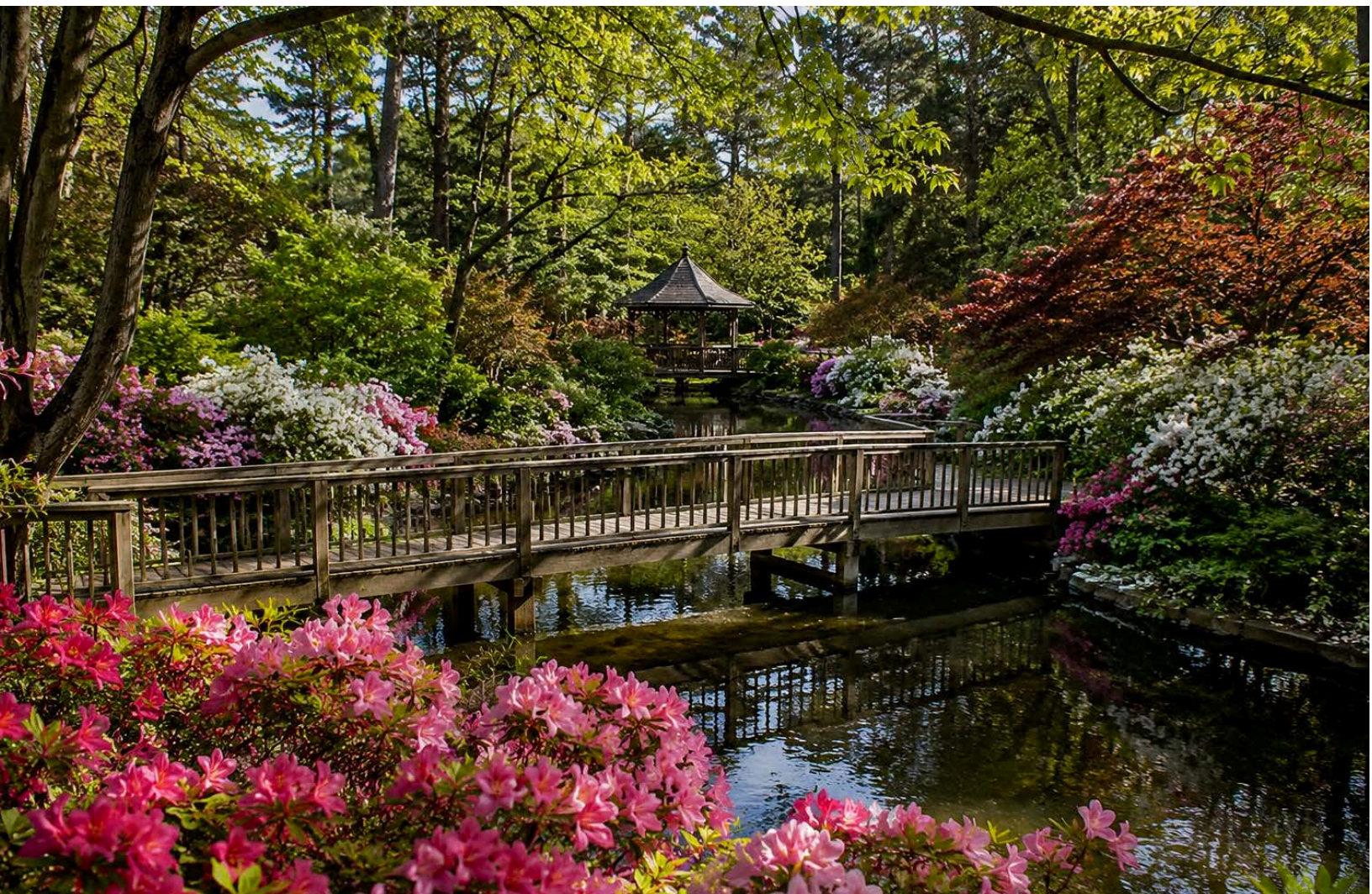

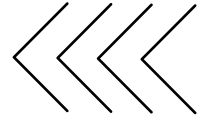

4. Alluvial Decoder at Crabtree Creek



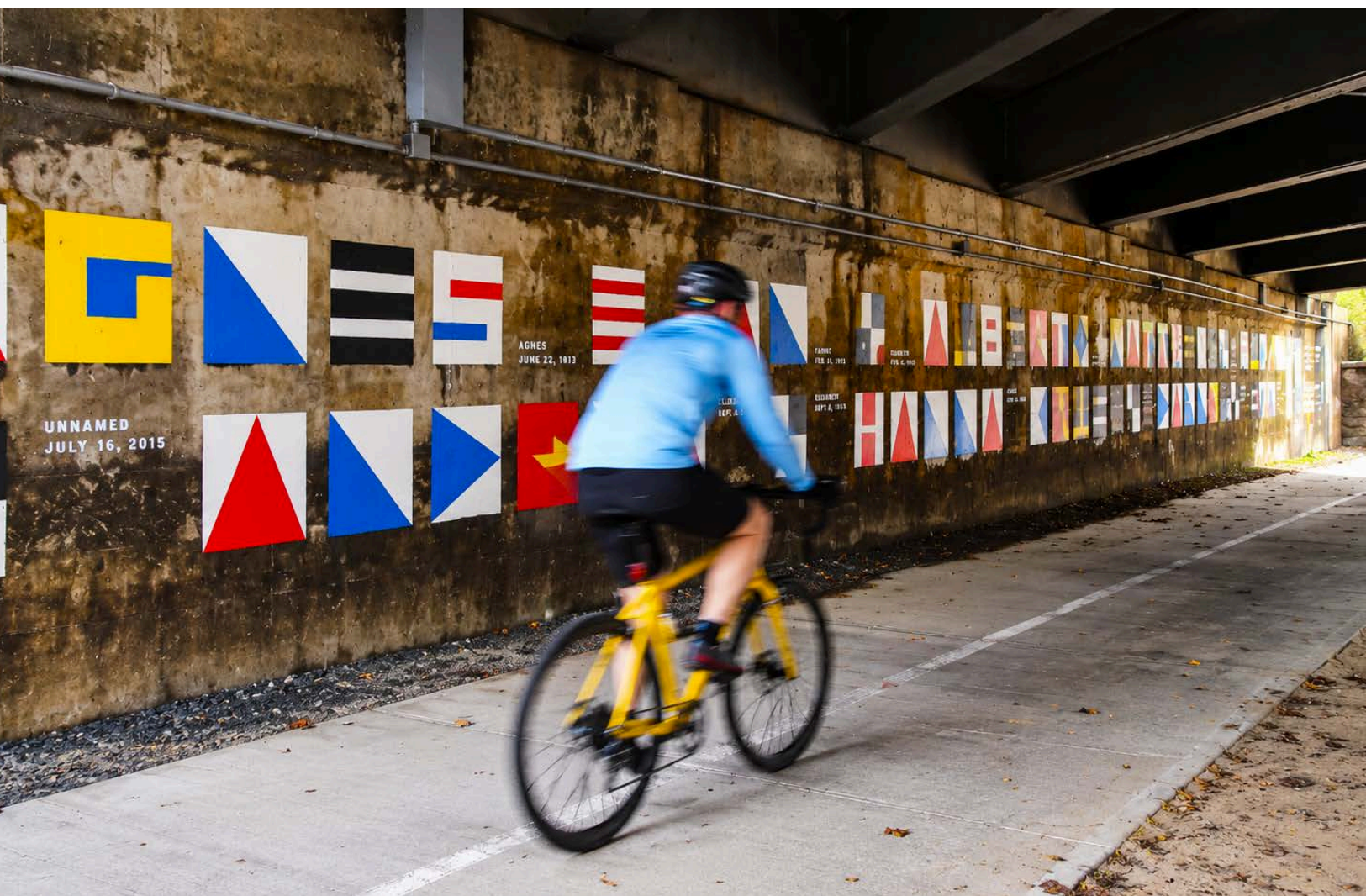

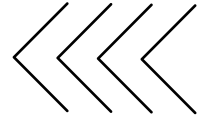

Alluvial Decoder is one of Raleigh's strangest hidden pieces of public art. Installed along the greenway, the structure acts as a flood marker and environmental art piece designed to visualize water levels and changing conditions at Crabtree Creek.

Most people walk or bike past without realizing what they are seeing. It feels obscure, artistic, and very "Atlas Obscura," making it perfect for people wanting something genuinely different.



5. Durham's Hidden Dinosaur (Bronto)
